A1 Using Story and text in Primary RE	Primary	5-11	Fiona Moss	Texts to teach about identity, lived religion and worldviews and beliefs will be explored together with strategies to use in RE lessons in the Primary school. Which texts? How can these be used? Come along to hear about and share ideas for texts to share and ideas of how to use them.
A2 Multidisciplinary RE	Primary	7-11	Stephen Pett	Help your pupils to become investigators in RE. We'll examine the kinds of questions asked by different investigators into religion and some different methods for finding and evaluating answers - in other words, we'll practise academic disciplines in RE. Enable your pupils to become psychologists, theologians or sociologists for a day!
A3 Ways with words: 7 strategies to promote peaceful discussion of contested issues	Cross phase	7-16	Angela Hill	The best RE is not afraid of controversy! This session will explore practical strategies for helping pupils engage in peaceful and productive discussion of contested issues in RE.
A4 A new Curriculum for Wales: Ideas and innovation for RE in schools everywhere	Cross phase	4-16	Jennie Downes	This seminar presents how Church in Wales schools are working to align the four purposes of Curriculum 2022 to their distinctive Christian Character and Vision. There will be lots of ideas to help you think about your RE curriculum wherever you teach. Schools have been creating curricula which draw the subject areas of history, geography and religious education together into 'humanities'. Using the concept of 'cynefin' (belonging) to ask the following questions: Who are we? Why are we here? How then do we live?
A5 Religious Studies and Religion and Worldviews. We teach both and here's why!	Secondary	11-16	Neil McKain	Neil is a Head of Department in an Independent School. In this session he will outline the rationale (INTENT) for his curriculum and why he teaches both Religious Studies and Religion and Worldviews. He will offer some concrete examples (IMPLEMENTATION) of how this is taught to different years with practical activities and resources that attendees can take back to their schools. Neil will also share examples of the impact this has had on his students including some examples of students sharing their work and their reflections on what they have learnt.
A6 Beginners Guide to Curriculum Building at Secondary	Secondary	11-16	Becky Palmer	This session will talk through strategies and share tools to aid in designing a curriculum for your own setting. We will draw on national and local guidance including good practice and share personal experiences of what has worked (and what hasn't). Helpful for those new to curriculum design (new HODs) and colleagues working in single person departments to articulate intention.

B1 Primary subject leadership (the how to guide)	Primary	5-11	Katie Freeman	In this session we will look at what it means to be an RE lead in the primary school, we will share resources that can be used, lesson ideas, monitoring suggestions and assessment tips. This session will be suitable for new to the role RE leads and also those who have been in post for a number of years.
B2 'Enlarge the Place of Your Tent': Exploring the Breadth of Christianity Within Your RE Curriculum	Primary	5-11	Jennifer Jenkins	This session will look at the breadth of Christianity that can be captured within your coverage of Christianity in your RE Curriculum. Discover how a range of Christian beliefs and practices across denominations and cultures can find their way into the primary classroom to enrich learning.
B3 From the city of Statue topplers	Cross phase	5-16	Janey Orchard & Adam Robertson	The iconic toppling of the statue of Edward Colston in central Bristol on June 7th 2020 has come to symbolise a renewed awareness of Britain's uncomfortable past. How can we learn from Black Theology and lived black experiences of religious life in Britain to re-imagine the RE curriculum? Using key moments of change and protest from our own local context as a starting point, we suggest practical ways in which religious knowledge and understanding can be promoted in age-appropriate ways in RE classrooms.
B4 Virtual visits and visitors (plundering the online)	Cross phase	5-16	Julia Diamond-Conway	Visits and visitors bring theoretical RE to life and can make incredibly valuable contributions to pupils' learning. Online resources are also great ways of adding to pupils' experiences here and have become especially useful tools over the last few months. Join this session if you want to think in more depth about how to ensure your pupils get the best opportunities possible to engage with visits and visitors without necessarily even leaving the classroom, alongside making the most of what's currently available online in your RE sessions.
B5 Engaging the Un-engaged	Secondary	11-16	Gerry Cohen	Sharing some adaptable tools and strategies in the classroom AND outside to encourage engagement. We will be sharing some tried and tested methods used by teachers with different skills. We will look at different ways to get reactions via sticky-notes, noise-makers, silent responses, sudden changes in lesson direction, live or recorded music or film clips, invisible pupil praise and other techniques. We'll also see a few different uses of artifacts and ways of developing religious literacy in your pupils.
B6 10 new thinkers linked to the A level curriculum	Secondary	16-18	Rachael Jackson Royal	This session will look at contemporary thinkers and ideas linked to the A level content for Philosophy, Ethics and Christianity. A must have for those who want to go beyond traditional thinkers and ideas and spice up their A level teaching.

With a focus on ‘ethical veganism’ as worldview, we will critically explore practical approaches for teaching about a wider range of worldviews.
