

Religious Odd one out

There are 6 bags, each with the following objects within them. Ask children to look at the objects and see how many different Odd ones out they can find between them. There are at least 2 in each bag.

Bag A

Jewish Kippur (white and gold male prayer cap, head covering showing humility before God); Sikh Kacchera (white cotton, Sikh underwear, worn by men and women once baptised, sign of modesty); Hijab (white & blue nylon, head covering for a Muslim woman, a sign of modesty), Nun's headdress (black and white, again showing modesty)



Bag B

Buddhist prayer flags (cotton and many colours symbolising prayers going up to God), Hindu diva candle (lots of colours, symbol of good winning over evil); Christian incense burner (brass, symbolises prayers going up to God and being a sweet thing for him to receive like incense), memorial Jewish candle (burn & lots of colours)



Bag C

Communion wafers (white yeast free bread, Christian a symbol of Jesus' body that was crucified); Halal Haribo (colourful, Ok for a Muslim person to eat); Jewish Seder plate (what you eat from when celebrating the Passover festival, remembering the Jewish people leaving being slaves in Egypt and going to the promised land); Coconut (Hinduism, symbol of fertility and blessing often given to a bride and bridegroom at their wedding)



Bag D

Torah scrolls (green and yellow, it is the first five books of the Jewish Bible or Christian Old Testament); Bible (blue and white Bible in Arabic); Quran (green and yellow also in Arabic), Humanism book



Bag E

Tiny Jewish Menorah (Jewish symbol of How God created the world in 7 days, and in each day to remember him), tiny Ganesh (Hindu god of success), Tiny kirpan (Sikh symbol of always being ready to defend their faith), big cross (Christian symbol of Jesus's death on the cross, in order to obtain forgiveness of sins)



Bag F

Buddhist begging bowl (Monks and nuns are not allowed to work or make their food, bowls used to collect food or money in order to buy food), Christian rosary (Prayer beads), Hindu bell (Rung to gain god's attention when you come to pray), Sikh wooden comb (Sikh symbol of keeping your hair clean and tidy, looked after)
