## 'What is your religion?' Self-identification

People who answer 'No religion' in a census or survey are sometimes called Nones by scholars. Notice the increase of Nones in the Census in England and Wales from 2001 to 2021. The Census asks: What is your religion? and gives a list of options, starting with 'No religion'.
